

(54) Improvements relating to entertainment machines

(57) An entertainment machine (2) comprising a game means for providing a game for which a player, in use, is awarded qualifying points according to his/her performances, prize selection means for providing the player with a selection of non-monetary prizes each having a predetermined value associated therewith; and qualifying point conversion means for allowing the play-

er, in use, to convert points that they have been awarded into a prize of his/her choice. Prizes can be delivered from remote sites to addresses specified by the player, thereby reducing the need to store prizes at the site of the entertainment machine.
